Footpath Encroachment: The “Right to Walk” Exists Only on Paper, Not on the Ground

Walking on the road is not a matter of begging for space; it is a fundamental right guaranteed by the Constitution.

Constitution, Supreme Court, Answer This: Who Has the Right Over the Footpath?

When simply walking on a footpath becomes a matter of risking one’s life, it means the city has been designed for cars, not for human beings. The Supreme Court has now settled this debate through its historic judgment of June 19, 2026.

PART 1: WHAT RIGHTS DOES THE CONSTITUTION GIVE YOU?

The right to walk is not a gift of any government scheme; it is embedded in the very spirit of the Constitution of India. 0. Article 19(1)(d) – Right to Move Freely Throughout India

The Constitution states that all citizens have the right to move freely throughout the territory of India.

The Supreme Court, while interpreting this provision, has held that movement does not merely mean travelling from one city to another. Being able to walk safely on one’s own street or road is also part of this right. If there is no footpath, the right guaranteed under Article 19(1)(d) remains incomplete. 0. Article 21 – Right to Life and Personal Liberty

This is the strongest constitutional foundation. Article 21 provides that no person shall be deprived of life or personal liberty except according to the procedure established by law.

The Supreme Court has expanded the scope of Article 21 through several judgments:

The meaning of life is not limited to mere existence; it includes the right to live with dignity and safety.

When a municipal authority provides



broken footpaths, poorly lit pathways and roads without proper crossings, it exposes citizens to daily danger. This directly affects the right to life under Article 21. 0. Connection with Articles 19(1)(a) and 19(1)(g) Walking is what enables people to reach markets, schools, workplaces and public spaces. Without proper footpaths, access to livelihood under Article 19(1)(g), as well as freedom of movement and expression, is adversely affected. 0. Directive Principles of State Policy and the Twelfth Schedule

Article 38: The State is required to promote a social order in which inequality is reduced. Six lanes for cars and zero lanes for pedestrians represent one of the starkest forms of urban inequality.

Article 243W and the Twelfth Schedule: Roads, footpaths, public works and civic amenities fall within the constitutional responsibilities of municipalities. These are not optional functions.

PART 2: WHAT HAS THE JUDICIARY SAID? – CASE BY CASE Earlier

Judgments That Laid the Foundation:

0. Olga Tellis v. Bombay Municipal Corporation (1985) In the case concerning pavement dwellers, the Court observed that footpaths are public property, while their primary public purpose is connected with pedestrian use. 0. Francis Coralie Mullin v. Administrator, Union Territory of Delhi (1981) Justice P.N. Bhagwati held that the right to life under Article 21 includes the right to live with human dignity, which encompasses conditions necessary for safe and dignified living. 0. Consumer Education & Research Centre Case (1995) The Court treated safe conditions necessary for life and well-being as falling within the protective scope of Article 21. THE DECISIVE JUDGMENT – JUNE 19, 2026 The case arose from the death of a five-year-old child in Haryana. The investigation reportedly found that there was no footpath, no speed breaker and no zebra crossing. A truck ran over the child while he was walking along the roadside.

A Bench comprising Justice Surya Kant and Justice K. V. Viswanathan issued

directions that have been described as a major development for the “Right to Walk” in India.

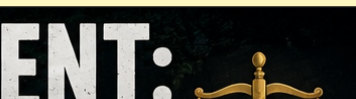
KEY POINTS:

0. Recognition of the Right “Walking on safe, obstruction-free, shaded and universally accessible footpaths is a fundamental right under Articles 19(1)(d) and 21.” 0. Government Responsibility

Providing footpaths is not merely a convenience; it is a statutory obligation.

In accordance with Indian Roads Congress standard IRC:103-2012, footpaths should have a minimum width of 1.8 metres and should be accessible to persons with disabilities on urban roads. 0. Encroachment and Illegal Parking

Permanent or temporary encroachments and illegal parking on footpaths interfere with pedestrians’ fundamental rights. The concerned authorities responsible for enforcement must be held accountable for ensuring pedestrian access.

fundamental rights are affected by unsafe or obstructed pedestrian infrastructure. 0. Complaint under Municipal Laws

Under the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957, including provisions dealing with obstruction and encroachment, or under the applicable municipal law of the concerned State, citizens can complain about encroachments affecting public streets and pedestrian access. Removing unlawful obstruction is an important municipal responsibility. 0. Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 Driving or parking vehicles on pedestrian areas can attract action under applicable provisions of the Motor Vehicles Act and traffic regulations. 0. Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 The law requires accessibility measures for persons with disabilities. Footpaths and pedestrian infrastructure must therefore be designed and maintained with ramps, tactile pathways and other accessibility features wherever required. Failure to provide accessible infrastructure can raise legal and statutory compliance issues. CONCLUSION: SAVING FOOTPATHS MEANS PROTECTING CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS

The message is clear: development cannot simply be measured by the number of flyovers and wider roads. True development is when a schoolchild, a person using a wheelchair, or an elderly woman can reach their destination without asking anyone for space, without being forced onto the road and without putting their life at risk. Therefore: At least 25% of the budget of every road project should be earmarked for pedestrian infrastructure. Footpaths should undergo independent third-party audits. A Citizen Walk Audit Committee should be established in every ward. Because as long as footpaths remain encroached upon, the “Right to Walk” will exist only on paper—not on the ground.

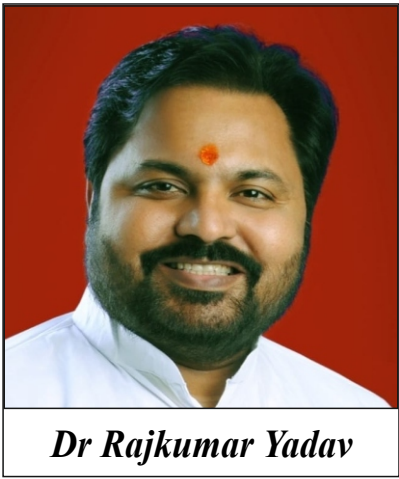

Serious questions have been raised about food safety amid inspections of restaurants and cheese vendors.

Sending samples to the lab is not enough; publicizing inspection

reports and regular action is needed. Rourkela. Restaurants and retail shops selling cheese in the Rourkela Municipal Corporation (RMC) area have been inspected and food samples have been sent for laboratory testing. Where non-compliance was found, improvement notices have also been issued to the establishments involved. This initiative is welcome, but the big question is: can inspections and sampling of a few shops alone curb the problem of adulterated milk and counterfeit cheese in Rourkela?

There have been constant complaints about the quality of milk, cheese, and other food items in Rourkela. Therefore, the Food Safety Department must develop a regular, impartial, and comprehensive inspection system, rather than limiting itself to campaigns and

photo ops. Continuous monitoring is especially necessary for shops and establishments that sell large quantities of milk, cheese, sweets, and other food items.

Why should reports be buried in files? The most important question concerns the reports that come after inspections. If samples were taken, what were their laboratory reports? How many samples met the standards and how many failed? Which establishments were taken action against?

The answers to these questions should be made public.

Removing stalls from fairs, markets, or roadside stalls or taking photographs during food inspections does not in itself guarantee health

safety. Real improvement is possible only when regular inspections of shops, sample testing, transparent reporting, and action are ensured against those found guilty.

Transparency is the Key to Trust Just as the government works to make data and reports publicly available in matters of pollution control and other matters of public importance, the RMC's Food Safety Department should also make the inspection reports public.

Whose interest is it to bury the inspection report after the investigation? The public has the right to know whether the milk, cheese, and food items they purchase are safe or not. The real fight against fake and adulterated food items can be won not through photo sessions but through constant monitoring, transparency and accountability.



These medicines are banned for children under four years of age: The government has issued a major ban on cold and flu medicines. India's major step towards safety, regulation, and good governance - a comprehensive analysis.

Government issues red alert on cold and flu medicines for young children - restrictions on administering these medicines to children under four years of age.

Drug safety is not limited to the doctor's office. Clear information on the medicine bottle and package can also be the first line of defense for patient safety. - Advocate Kishan Sanmukhdas Bhawnani, Gondia, Maharashtra

Gondia - Globally, it is not enough for any country to simply form a government, exercise power, and announce development plans.

The test of true good governance is revealed when the government continuously monitors, strictly regulates, and takes timely decisions even in areas of public interest where even the slightest administrative lapse can cost a citizen their life.

Health and drug safety are such highly sensitive areas. Especially in the case of young children, the responsibility of the government, drug manufacturers, doctors, pharmacists, and parents increases manifold. In light of this broader public interest and child safety, the strict regulatory measures taken by the Central Government on August 22, 2026, regarding certain fixed-dose combinations of chlorpheniramine maleate and phenylephrine hydrochloride for children under four years of age are considered significant. I, Advocate Kishan Sanmukhdas Bhawnani, Gondia, Maharashtra, believe that the primary purpose of this government decision is not to instill fear about the common cold, but to minimize the potential risks from unnecessary or inappropriate use of such medications in young children. According to media reports, the fixed-dose combination of these two active ingredients was considered at the expert level, and following recommendations from the Drugs Technical Advisory Board, restrictions were imposed on its use in children under four years of age. Manufacturers are required to provide clear age-related warnings on labels, packaging, accompanying information, and promotional materials, stating that such medications should not be given to children under four years of age. This regulation is important because drug safety is not limited to the doctor's office; clear information on the bottle and package can also serve as the first line of patient protection.

Friends, according to media reports, chlorpheniramine is an antihistamine used to treat allergies and some cold-related symptoms. Phenylephrine, on the other hand, is used as a decongestant to relieve symptoms such as nasal congestion and stuffiness.

These combinations have been found in some medicines for colds and upper respiratory tract symptoms. However, it's important to understand that the use of a medicine in adults or older children does not automatically mean that it will be equally suitable for very young children. Children's bodies are developing; their weight, metabolism, organ function, and response to medicines change with age. Therefore, the appropriateness of drug dosage, combination, and use in pediatrics requires a different scientific approach. This is where the government's new move becomes not simply a ban on a medicine, but an example of regulatory precaution—a policy designed to manage potential

risks in advance. If relatively safer alternatives are available for a particular age group and expert committees point out the potential risks of a particular combination, the regulatory body has the responsibility to ensure the use of the medicines on the market is safe through clear regulations. It's natural to be cautious, especially with children under four years of age, as parents in this age group may often attempt to self-medicate based on their symptoms.

The notion that "colds are common illnesses" can sometimes lead to misplaced confidence. Friends This decision also brings an important message to peers and parents: giving children medication should not be a matter of mere guesswork. Giving children medication for colds, coughs, allergies, or nasal congestion without medical advice, especially to children under four years of age, can be risky. Parents should read the age-related warnings on the medication packaging, avoid self-administering the dosage, and give the medication as prescribed by a doctor according to the prescribed dosage and duration. If a medication label contains a warning or limits its use to the



child's age, it's best not to ignore it. Health awareness and the digital age also play a crucial role here. Today, parents increasingly access health information from the internet and social media, but not all online advice is medically proven. Prescribing a medication to another child based on the fact that an acquaintance gave it to them and it worked is not safe medical practice. A child's age, weight, symptoms, cause of illness, and potential interactions with other medications may vary. Therefore, digital information cannot be a substitute for a doctor's advice.

Friends, the government's current move should also be seen against the backdrop of extensive drug regulation efforts over the past few months. According to available information, in June 2026, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare banned the manufacture, sale, and distribution of 16 fixed-dose combination drugs. Furthermore, regulatory tightening related to removing syrups, including cough syrups, from the over-the-counter category and providing medicines through prescriptions has also been mentioned. Taken together, these steps

clearly demonstrate the government's increasing focus in the pharmaceutical sector not only on drug availability but also on drug quality, suitability, monitoring, and responsible use. Cases of child deaths due to contaminated cough syrups have further heightened the urgency of this issue. Cases involving toxic contaminants like diethylene glycol have reminded the world that while medicines are life-saving tools, serious negligence in their manufacturing, quality control, storage, distribution, or use can turn these same medicines into life-threatening risks. Incidents of child deaths linked to contaminated syrups in various places, including Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan, have raised serious questions about drug safety, quality testing, and regulatory accountability. Therefore, drug safety does not simply mean banning a single active ingredient, but rather monitoring the entire chain from production to delivery to the patient.

Friends, an important question here is: will a mere central government order ensure drug safety? The answer is a clear no. In a vast, federal country like India, the central government, along with the state drug controllers, the Food and Drug Administration, local inspection systems, hospitals, doctors, pharmacists, and pharmaceutical companies, are equally responsible. Directives issued by the central government will be effective only if their strict compliance is ensured at the state level. Regular inspections of the sale of banned or age-specific drugs at medical stores should be conducted, the prescription system should be strictly followed, and timely action should be taken against manufacturers or sellers who violate the rules.

Friends, pharmaceutical companies also have no less responsibility in this entire system. A drug should not be produced simply because there is demand for it in the market. The pharmaceutical industry's primary objective should be profit as well as patient safety. Simply writing warnings in small print on packaging will not suffice. Warnings should be in a language and location that the average consumer can easily understand. Promotional materials must also avoid presenting information that misleads parents into believing that all cold and flu medicines are automatically safe for children. The true purpose of regulation will only be achieved when compliance moves from paper to practice.

Friends, even internationally, the fundamental principle of drug safety is that the use of medicines for children should be based on scientific evidence, age-specific safety, and clear regulatory guidelines. Pediatric medicine safety is becoming an increasingly important public health issue worldwide. This becomes even more important in a large market like India, where medicines are widely available and millions of families are empowered to make their own health decisions. Therefore, the government's responsibility lies not only in issuing bans, but also in creating public awareness, strengthening monitoring systems, and taking prompt action against violations.

Friends, this entire incident reveals a broader definition of good governance. Good governance isn't just about large projects, digital services, or economic growth. When the government identifies potential health risks, consults experts, decides on the recommendations of technical advisory boards, mandates companies to issue clear warnings, and provides additional protection to vulnerable groups like children, the

humane side of governance comes to the fore. The public expects the government to develop the ability to anticipate and prevent potential crises, rather than reacting after a crisis has occurred.

Yet, the road ahead is long. Action against just one or two drugs or a few FDCs will not completely eliminate the drug safety problem. The country must strengthen continuous pharmacovigilance, robust quality testing laboratories, rapid sample testing, adequate human resources in the state drug control system, digital tracking, and accountability of drug manufacturers. The process of identifying and withdrawing suspect drugs from the market must also be swift and transparent. If serious adverse effects are discovered due to a drug, the reporting and investigation process should be simple for even the average citizen.

Friends, the most important thing is to change the mindset of considering drug safety solely the responsibility of the Ministry of Health. It is a shared responsibility of the government, regulatory bodies, doctors, pharmacists, pharmaceutical companies, hospitals, and ordinary citizens. The current move by the Central Government regarding the FDC containing chlorpheniramine maleate and phenylephrine hydrochloride for children under four years of age is an important regulatory message towards strengthening this shared responsibility.

So, if we study and analyze the entire above, we will find that the true progress of any nation should not be measured by the number of drugs it launches, but by the robust system it has built to provide safe medicines to its citizens. The principle of "precaution first, then treatment" is crucial when it comes to the safety of young children. If this government decision is implemented with rigorous oversight, transparent regulation,

medical responsibility, industry accountability, and parental awareness, it will not remain merely a regulatory order but can become an effective example of good governance based on public interest.

Today, citizens of every country in the world expect governments not only to provide leadership, but also to make timely and appropriate decisions when it comes to the lives and health of citizens, to strictly enforce regulations, and to prevent any potential danger before it becomes a major crisis. Protecting children's health is the most humane and essential hallmark of responsible governance.

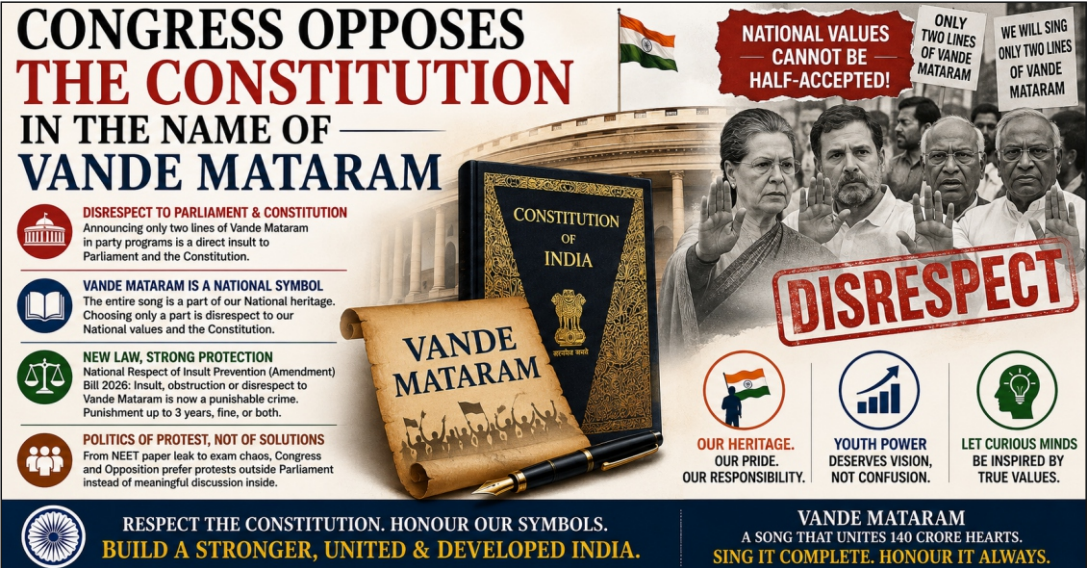

Rourkela/Sundargarh. Union Minister Jual Oram, through a Facebook post, issued a clear and strong clarification on the questions and alleged propaganda surrounding the role of his District Representative, Khushbu Yadav. He stated that appropriate action will be taken under the law against anyone who creates, publishes, or disseminates false and defamatory information and attempts to damage someone's reputation.

Questions about Khushbu Yadav's BJP membership remain.While this clarification from the Union Minister clarifies Khushbu Yadav's role as a District Representative, her absence from the APS, and her proposed Additional District Representative (ADPS) appointment, questions remain about her membership in the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). 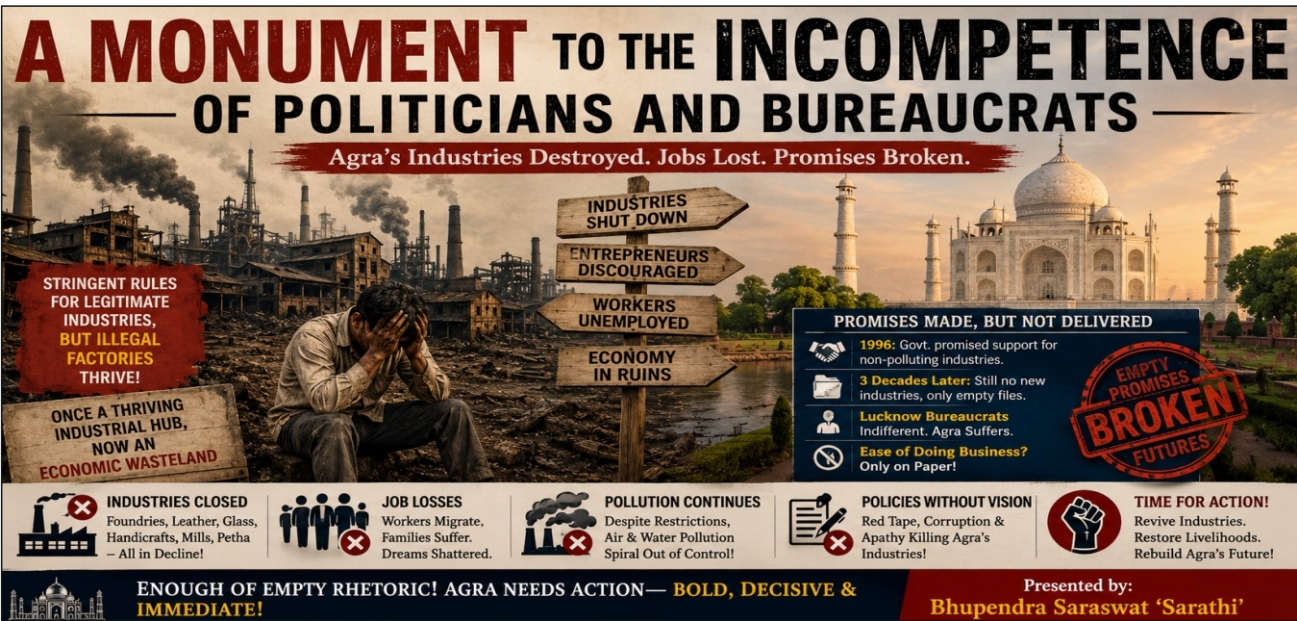
A Monument to the Incompetence of Politicians and Bureaucrats

Agra's industrial sector is in ruins, a victim not of natural decline but of government apathy and bureaucratic inaction. In their obsessive zeal to "preserve" the Taj Mahal, successive governments have systematically destroyed the city's industries, leaving entrepreneurs struggling, workers unemployed, and the economy gasping for breath.

While legitimate industries were eliminated in the name of environmental protection, illegal factories sprang up right under the noses of so-called officials. Air and water pollution is spiraling out of control, proving that these stringent restrictions were nothing more than a bureaucratic sham. Agra, once a thriving hub of industry, is now stagnant, forcing its skilled artisans and entrepreneurs to close their shops or flee to friendlier states. The 1993 Supreme Court decision to curb pollution in the Taj Trapezium Zone (TTZ) proved to be the first nail in the coffin. Industrial carnage followed. The iron foundries, glass factories, and leather industries that once defined Agra's economic landscape were left to wither and die. Instead of formulating a visionary industrial policy, government officials sat idly by as businesses collapsed, livelihoods were lost, and despair prevailed.



For three decades, not a single new industry was allowed to flourish. The State Pollution Control Board, acting more like an executioner than a regulator, has made it nearly impossible to establish or expand industries. The result? Agra's industrialists have become refugees on their own land, fleeing to Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, or any other place that offers even the slightest hope.

In 1996, both the central and state governments vowed to support non-polluting industries. Nearly three decades later, those promises remain empty words in dusty files. Meanwhile, Lucknow bureaucrats, ensconced in their plush offices, remain completely indifferent to Agra's plight.

A former president of the

Chamber of Industries and Commerce bluntly stated: "Lucknow officials don't care about Agra's industrial future. They imposed restrictions but never bothered to create alternatives. The result is that business in the city has come to a standstill and dreams have been shattered."While ministers talk a lot about "ease of doing business" in Uttar Pradesh, entrepreneurs on the ground face insurmountable obstacles like corruption, red tape, and a lack of vision. So-called "development" policies are mere window dressing, designed to look good on paper, while industries are languishing in reality.

Agra has been home to world-class artisans, craftsmen, and industrialists. The city once thrived with iron foundries,

leather shoes, glassware, handicrafts, flour and oil mills, and the iconic petha. But due to government neglect, these industries are now on life support. The leather industry, once the backbone of Agra's economy, is now struggling with recession and declining exports. Iron foundries, which once fueled India's agricultural revolution, have either closed or are operating at a very low rate.

Job losses are staggering. With no work left in Agra, workers continue to migrate to cities like Delhi and Gurgaon, where they take up menial jobs to eke out a living. An entire region that could have been a thriving industrial powerhouse has been transformed into an economic wasteland.

Ironically, despite industrial

restrictions, pollution continues unabated. The Taj Mahal, the monument these policies sought to protect, remains vulnerable to environmental damage. And in the process, Agra's economy has been ruthlessly sacrificed at the altar of government incompetence.

This must not happen to Agra. The city doesn't lack ambition, talent, or potential. What it lacks is a government that truly cares. It's time for the authorities to wake up, acknowledge the destruction they've wrought, and take immediate steps to revive Agra's industrial sector.

XUV seized, six close associates detained; police intensify search for absconding accused

Surrender notice issued by Monday, NBW prepared if needed; investigation progresses based on findings during remand

Rourkela. Police action has intensified in the much-talked-about Circuit House incident. Police are reportedly close to Prakash Paswan, suspended from the BJP, in this case involving the recovery of a pistol and cartridges. However, the police have taken his failure to be arrested as a challenge and are continuing to search for him.

During the investigation, police have seized the XUV car allegedly used by Prakash Paswan. It is reported that the vehicle is registered in the name of a person named Adil. The seizure of the vehicle is considered a crucial link in the investigation. Six close associates questioned

Police have detained and initiated interrogation of six individuals,

including Amit Nayak, Prashant Bansal, and Suraj, who are said to be close associates of Prakash Paswan. Paswan's family members are also under police scrutiny. Police are gathering information from these individuals about Paswan's possible whereabouts, contacts, and activities related to the incident.

Police have issued a notice at Prakash Paswan's home, demanding his surrender by Monday. Failure to surrender by the stipulated time could result in the issuance of an NBW (non-bailable warrant) against him.

A science museum is much more than a collection of models, machines, photographs and scientific instruments. It is a place where curiosity comes alive, questions are encouraged and complicated ideas become easier to understand. In classrooms, students often learn science through textbooks, diagrams and examinations. In a science museum, however, they can see, touch, observe and sometimes interact with scientific concepts. This makes the experience more memorable and meaningful.

Science has transformed almost every aspect of human life. From electricity and medicine to space exploration, artificial intelligence, communication and transportation, scientific discoveries have changed the way we live. Yet many people experience science only through textbooks or news reports. Science museums provide an opportunity to bring this knowledge closer to ordinary people and especially to young learners.

From Reading Science to Experiencing Science

One of the greatest strengths of a science museum is its ability to turn abstract ideas into visible experiences. A textbook may explain how planets move, how a human heart works or how electricity flows through a circuit. A museum can demonstrate these ideas through working models, animations, experiments and interactive exhibits.

When students observe a scientific principle in action, they often understand it differently from simply memorising a definition. A model of the solar system can make planetary motion easier to imagine. A working machine can explain mechanical principles. A demonstration of light, sound or magnetism can transform a difficult chapter into an exciting experience.

This is why science museums are valuable extensions of the classroom. They do not replace teachers or textbooks; rather, they complement them.

The Power of Curiosity

Every scientific discovery begins with a question. Why does an object fall? Why does the Moon appear to change shape? How do birds fly? How does the human body fight disease? How can machines learn?

Children naturally ask questions, but traditional education sometimes focuses more on

finding the correct answer than on asking meaningful questions. Science museums can restore the importance of curiosity.

A good exhibit does not merely provide information. It encourages visitors to think. An interactive display may allow a child to change a variable and observe what happens. A scientific puzzle may require visitors to make predictions. Such experiences encourage observation, reasoning and experimentation.

The most valuable lesson from a science museum may therefore not be a particular scientific fact. It may be the habit of asking, “Why?” Science Museums and Education

Science museums can play an important role in strengthening science education. Students from different backgrounds can encounter scientific ideas in an informal learning environment. School visits can connect classroom lessons with practical demonstrations.

For teachers, museums can also become useful educational resources. A visit can be connected with lessons in physics, chemistry, biology, mathematics, environmental science, astronomy and technology. Students can be encouraged to prepare questions before the visit and discuss their observations afterward.

Such activities can turn a museum visit from a recreational outing into a meaningful learning experience.

Learning Through Interaction

Modern science museums increasingly use interactive exhibits. Instead of simply looking at an object behind glass, visitors may be able to operate a mechanism, conduct a simple experiment or observe the consequences of changing a condition.

Interactive learning can make visitors active participants rather than passive observers. It encourages them to explore at their own pace and learn through trial and observation.

For example, an exhibit demonstrating forces may allow visitors to experiment with different conditions. An optical display may demonstrate how the brain interprets images. A robotics exhibit may show how sensors and programming allow machines to respond to their surroundings.

Such experiences can make scientific concepts more approachable.

The Role of Technology Technology is changing the modern science museum. Digital screens, computer simulations, augmented reality, virtual reality and multimedia presentations can help explain phenomena that cannot easily be demonstrated physically.

A visitor can virtually travel through the human body, explore the surface of another planet or observe astronomical phenomena. Complex scientific processes can be represented through animation and

simulation.

However, technology should remain a tool rather than the main attraction. A science museum should not become merely a collection of screens. The purpose of technology should be to improve understanding, stimulate curiosity and encourage scientific thinking.

Inspiring Future Scientists A science museum can influence a young person's future in unexpected ways. A child who sees a robotic arm, a telescope, a dinosaur fossil or a model of a spacecraft may suddenly become interested in engineering, astronomy, biology or geology.

Not every visitor will become a scientist, and that is not the only goal. Science education should help people become scientifically literate citizens who can understand evidence, evaluate claims and make informed decisions.

Nevertheless, museums can provide important inspiration to those who eventually choose careers in science, medicine, engineering, technology and research.

Connecting Science with Everyday Life

One common problem in science education is the feeling that science is something found only in laboratories and textbooks. In reality, science surrounds us.

Cooking involves chemistry. Walking involves physics and biology. Smartphones depend on electronics, computer science and telecommunications. Weather involves atmospheric science. Agriculture depends on biology, chemistry and environmental science.

Science museums can help visitors recognise these connections. When scientific principles are connected with everyday experiences, science becomes less distant and more relevant.

Science and Society

Science museums also have an important social responsibility. Modern society faces complex challenges such as climate change, pollution, water scarcity, energy demands, emerging diseases, biodiversity loss and the responsible use of artificial intelligence.

People need reliable scientific

information to understand these issues. Museums can present difficult topics in accessible language and encourage evidence-based thinking.

They can also help visitors understand that science is not simply a collection of facts. Scientific knowledge develops through observation, experimentation, evidence, debate and revision. Understanding this process is especially important in an age of misinformation.

Preserving Scientific Heritage

Science museums also preserve the history of human discovery. Old instruments, scientific models, laboratory equipment, photographs and documents tell the story of how knowledge developed.

A historical telescope, microscope or calculating machine is not merely an old object. It represents the curiosity, creativity and effort of people who worked before us.

Understanding scientific history reminds us that today's advanced technologies are the result of generations of observation, experimentation and innovation.

Museums for Families

Science museums are not only for students. They can become valuable family learning spaces.

Parents and children can explore exhibits together, discuss questions and conduct simple activities. Such experiences can create a positive attitude toward learning. Instead of asking children only about marks and examinations, parents can ask what they discovered, what surprised them and what questions they still have.

A family visit to a science museum can therefore become an opportunity for shared curiosity.

The Importance of Accessibility

A truly successful science museum should be accessible to everyone. Children from rural areas, students from economically weaker backgrounds and visitors with disabilities should have opportunities to experience scientific learning.

Mobile science exhibitions, travelling laboratories, community science centres and digital museum resources can extend the reach of science

beyond major cities.

This is particularly important in a country as large and diverse as India. Scientific curiosity should not depend on where a child is born or the economic circumstances of the family.

Science Museums in the Digital Age

The internet provides enormous quantities of scientific information, but digital information and physical museums serve different purposes.

Online videos can explain an experiment. Virtual simulations can demonstrate scientific processes. Digital libraries can provide access to research and educational materials. Yet a physical museum offers something special: the experience of being surrounded by scientific objects, demonstrations and other curious learners.

The future may therefore belong to a combination of physical and digital learning. Museums can provide hands-on experiences while digital platforms can extend those experiences beyond the museum walls.

Beyond Memorisation

Perhaps the most important contribution of a science museum is its ability to promote learning beyond memorisation.

Education should not simply teach students to remember formulas, definitions and facts. It should help them observe carefully, think logically, ask questions, test ideas and understand evidence.

A science museum naturally supports these habits. It creates situations in which visitors can wonder, predict, observe and discover.

This approach is particularly valuable in an era of artificial intelligence. When technology can quickly provide answers, the ability to ask good questions, evaluate information and think critically becomes even more important.

Science Museums and Innovation

Innovation begins when people are willing to look at familiar problems differently. Science museums can nurture this mindset by exposing visitors to inventions, experiments and

scientific possibilities.

Young people who see how simple ideas developed into useful technologies may become more willing to experiment themselves. Museums can also organise workshops, science fairs, maker spaces and innovation programmes where students can build and test their own ideas.

Such activities can help transform students from consumers of technology into creators of technology.

A Place Where Questions Matter

The true success of a science museum should not be measured only by the number of visitors or exhibits it contains. A better question is: How many questions did it create?

If a child leaves a museum wondering how a machine works, why stars shine, how vaccines protect people or whether humans could live on another planet, the museum has already achieved something valuable.

Curiosity is the first step toward investigation, and investigation is the foundation of science.

Conclusion

A science museum is a classroom without traditional walls. It is a laboratory of curiosity, a window into discovery and a bridge between scientific knowledge and everyday life.

In a rapidly changing world, scientific literacy is not a luxury. People need to understand science to make informed decisions about health, technology, the environment and society. Science museums can play a major role in developing this understanding.

The best science museum does not tell visitors, “Here are all the answers.” It encourages them to ask better questions.

A visit may last a few hours, but the curiosity it awakens can last for years. Perhaps that is the greatest power of a science museum: it does not merely display the story of science—it invites every visitor to become part of the continuing story of discovery.

12 public complaints were presented at the District Public Relations and Grievance Redressal Committee meeting, 10 were resolved on the spot.

Haryana/Hisar (Rajesh Saluja): A meeting of the District Grievance Committee was held on Saturday in the auditorium of SD Women's College under the chairmanship of State Education Minister Mr. Mahipal Dhanda. MLA Vinod Bhayana, Deputy Commissioner Rahul Narwal, Superintendent of Police Vinod Kumar, along with senior officials from various departments, and committee members were present. Twelve public complaints related to various departments were presented at the meeting, of which the Education Minister resolved 10 on the spot, while keeping two cases pending, instructing the concerned officials to take appropriate action and ensure resolution. He directed officials from all departments to resolve citizens' problems on a priority basis. Upon arrival at the meeting, MLA Vinod Bhayana and Deputy Commissioner Rahul Narwal welcomed the Education Minister with a bouquet of flowers. During the meeting, a complaint regarding the stormwater drain was submitted by the Dhani Puria Gram Panchayat. Taking cognizance of the complaint, Cabinet Minister Mr. Mahipal Dhanda directed the officials of the concerned department to complete the drain

construction work as soon as possible. He also appealed to the villagers not to interfere with the drain construction work, but to cooperate with the administration in completing the development work, so that a permanent solution to the stormwater drainage problem can be found.

Responding to a complaint from Gram Panchayat Ghirai regarding the drinking water problem, the Cabinet Minister inquired from the Public Health Department officials about the current status of the project. The officials informed that the tender for the project to improve the drinking water system in the village has been allotted and construction work will commence on the site soon. The Education Minister directed the officials to ensure that there are no unnecessary delays in the work and that the villagers are provided with better drinking water facilities.

Responding to a complaint from Sandeep, a resident of Sultanpur village, regarding assault, Cabinet Minister Mr. Mahipal Dhanda directed the police department officials to conduct an impartial investigation into the matter. He said that the matter should be re-investigated by including two members of the District Grievance Committee on the committee, so that the complainant receives justice and appropriate action is taken based on the facts.

Regarding a complaint from Hansi city resident Pravesh Jangra regarding drinking water and sewerage, the Education Minister directed Public Health Department officials to resolve both issues on a priority basis. He asked officials to set a timeframe for ensuring smooth drinking water supply. Officials stated that an estimate for repairing the sewerage line has been submitted to the government and technically approved. The Minister directed that the necessary procedures be completed and work commenced promptly.

A complaint from Rajkumar, a resident of Singhwa Ragho village, regarding non-receipt of crop insurance funds was also raised in the meeting. The Cabinet Minister directed officials from the concerned departments to ensure that necessary action is taken on priority to provide crop insurance funds and ensure that eligible farmers receive the benefits. Similarly, residents of Majra village submitted a complaint regarding the provision of 100-square-yard plots. Taking the matter seriously, Mr. Mahipal Dhanda directed the SDM Narnaund to investigate and take necessary action based on the facts.

Education Minister Mr. Mahipal Dhanda, in addition to hearing the public grievances on the District Grievance Committee's agenda, also listened to the concerns of other citizens who had attended the meeting. He directed officials to resolve citizens' problems promptly and on a



priority basis. He stated that the government's objective is to ensure timely resolution of public problems, and officials should work with a spirit of public service. Amnesty International Report Brings Disrepute to India in the Global Community!

Under the Modi regime—led by the BJP and steered by the Sangh—

the Government of India has abandoned the consensus-based, independent foreign policy

adopted since independence; consequently, it has garnered nothing but international infamy. As a result, India's standing within the global community has declined, and its credibility has been eroded.

The Modi regime's duplicity regarding the Palestine issue is evident. Prior to 2014—including during the tenure of Atal Bihari Vajpayee—

our stance was that Israel was occupying Palestinian land; therefore, Palestine should be liberated through a two-state solution that included handing over the holy city of Jerusalem to Palestine. From independence until the advent of the Modi regime, we adhered to this policy.

This policy was rooted in an Indian nationalism committed to secularism and opposed to colonialism—

a stance further reinforced by the policy of Non-Alignment. It was this very policy that drove us to express solidarity with the popular struggles in South Africa and oppose colonial hegemony there. That is why our sympathies never lay with Israel, a nation that—

in league with imperialist America—

has adopted an aggressive, expansionist posture. Although we recognized Israel's existence in 1950, that recognition did not come at the cost of the Palestinian people's destruction; India consistently championed their right to self-determination and independence. Until 2014, we maintained a deliberate distance from Israel, even while upholding diplomatic relations. India never supported Israeli attacks on Palestine in any form, nor the displacement of Palestinians from their homeland.

However, in the 'New India' of the Modi regime, all these principles have become relics of the past. Netanyahu is now a dear friend of Mr. Modi. Our people are already struggling to repay the debt owed to their motherland; on top of that, thanks to Modi, the burden of a 'fatherland' has also been imposed upon them. Naturally, our motherland had to remain silent regarding the resolutions moved against this fatherland's

actions at the United Nations. The Government of India has done exactly that, supporting Israel through the back door by abstaining from voting at the UN on several occasions. The 'Sanghi' faction believes in patriarchy, and the BJP's conduct aligns with this ideology.

New defense agreements are now being forged with Israel; under these pacts, large-scale arms supplies are being provided for the genocide of Palestinians—even as several European nations have halted arms exports following the Gaza war. An Amnesty International report exposes the 'Sanghi' faction's claim that India still stands with the Palestinians. In an Israeli attack on a UN-run school in Nuseirat, Gaza—where displaced Palestinians had sought refuge—on June 6, 2024, thirty-three Palestinians were killed. Fragments of 'Made in India' missiles were found at the site following the attack. Similarly, during the early days of the conflict involving the US, Israel, and Iran this year, an attack on a primary school in Minab, in southern Iran's Hormozgan province, on February 28, 2026, resulted in approximately 175 deaths; the majority of the victims were schoolgirls aged between 7 and 12. Reports indicate that Indian-made weapons were used in this attack as well. India is in no position to refuse arms supplies to Israel; notably, in May 2024, Spain blocked a ship named Marianne Danica—

carrying 27 tons of explosives from Chennai to Israel—from entering its port, as countries like

Spain and Canada have banned arms supplies to Israel due to its genocide of Palestinians. This has caused India significant embarrassment within the international community.

According to reports, 2,596 shipments were sent from India to Israel over a 26-month period—from October 2023 to November 2025—averaging 3 to 4 shipments daily. These exports included hundreds of thousands of weapon parts, ammunition components, and military vehicle parts. The goods were primarily sent to Israeli companies such as Elbit Systems, Rafael, and Israel Aerospace Industries, which supply the Israeli military directly. These supplies were provided by companies including Munitions India Limited, Premier Explosives, Kalyani, and the Adani-Israel joint venture. It is evident that both public and private Indian companies are supplying arms to Israel, with crony capitalists like Adani reaping massive profits in the process. It is common knowledge that a primary objective of the Modi government remaining in power is to fill Adani's coffers.

rThe International Court of Justice has ordered a halt to the ongoing genocide in Palestine and the

arrest of Netanyahu for war crimes. Against this backdrop, India's supply of arms to Israel is wrong from both moral and legal standpoints. While the Modi government has claimed that India's relations with Israel are fully in accordance with international norms, this claim is flawed because the Indian government is



bound by the provisions of the UN Genocide Convention. Under this convention, India bears the responsibility not only to prevent acts of genocide but also to address the countries committing them and also punish them. However, the exact opposite is happening in the case of Israel, with which there is direct complicity in the genocide of Palestinians. Therefore, both India and Israel bear equal responsibility for the ongoing genocide and war crimes in Palestine.

Ranchi: As per the instructions of the Election Commission of India, the second and final special camp for Form 6 and Form 8 was organized at all polling stations in the district under the Jharkhand Special Intensive Revision-2026. Through the camp, applications were received from the public for adding names to the voter list, making necessary amendments to names, addresses, etc., and other procedures related to the voter list, and necessary information was provided.

On this occasion, the dynamic District Deputy Election Officer, Mrs. Parul Singh, inspected the special camps organized in Kapali and Chandil areas. She inspected the polling booth numbers 347, 348, 349, 350, 351, 352, 353 and 354 of Alkabar Polytechnic College located in Kapali and the special camps organized in polling booth numbers 358, 359, 360, 361, 362 and 363 of Kashipur. During this, she talked to the BLOs and the general public present there and took information about the activities of the camp and the applications received and gave necessary instructions.

During the inspection, the District Deputy Election Officer directed that 100% of unpaired voters be provided with notices as per the rules, so that all concerned voters can submit the necessary documents within the deadline and there is no difficulty in the revision process. He directed the concerned officials and BLOs to regularly monitor the notice distribution process and provide the necessary information to all eligible voters in a timely manner.

He directed that wide publicity be ensured for the special camp, so that as many eligible citizens as possible can obtain information about the camp and

enroll their names in the voter list or make necessary amendments as per the prescribed procedure. Special emphasis was placed on disseminating information related to the special camp and voter list revision to as many people as possible through various mediums available at the local level.

He appealed to the public present to be aware themselves and also motivate eligible citizens around them to register their names in the voter list. Information was provided regarding Form-6 for adding eligible citizens who were left out to the voter list and Form-8 for making necessary amendments and transfers to the name, address, or other details in the voter list.

The District Deputy Election Officer issued clear instructions that under no circumstances should any eligible voter be denied inclusion in the electoral roll, and that no ineligible person be included in the electoral roll. To this end, BLOs and related personnel were instructed to carefully examine the received applications and documents and ensure necessary action only after verification as per the rules.

During the camp, the public was also informed about the online application facility for services related to the voter list. Eligible citizens were urged to submit their applications and required documents within the stipulated timeframe, as per the established procedures, and to check the status of their names and those of their family members on the voter list.

The District Deputy Election Officer directed the concerned officials and BLOs to ensure timely, fair, and consistent verification of the applications and documents received at the special camp. They also directed them to ensure full compliance with all provisions set by the Election Commission to maintain the accuracy and transparency of the voter list.

Which big leader did they want to kill,Union Minister Jual Oram's call records should be checked: Congress

Bhubaneswar: A press conference was held at Congress Bhavan on behalf of the media department regarding the criminal activities of Union Minister Jual Oram's Rourkela Municipal Corporation representative Prakash Paswan. In this press conference, OPCC senior spokesperson Sonali Sahu said that while the law and order situation in the state is not improving, another heinous incident has taken place in Rourkela.

The blueprint was drawn from Rourkela Circuit House to kill any big leader of the state and to create a large-scale massacre in the state. This blueprint was not made by anyone else, nor by any other organization or political party. This conspiracy was made by the government party, that is, the government itself made this plan. This conspiracy was hatched by Prakash Paswan, a special person of the Sundargarh MP and Union Tribal Development Minister, and Rourkela Municipal Corporation MP, who comes under his parliamentary constituency.

On the 14th, Raghunathpali police, after receiving information from some source, arrested 3 people (Vikash, Rajesh and Sagar) from Room No. 103 of Rourkela (Paanpos) Circuit House and seized 4 guns and 11 live bullets. Five criminals of the said gang are absconding.

Out of the 3 arrested, Rajesh was earlier arrested and jailed in a gun trafficking case. The other two, Vikash and Sagar, have criminal cases in their names.

Although Room No. 101 of Rourkela was booked in the name of Union Minister Joel Oram, a member of the Rourkela Municipal Corporation, Prakash Paswan, he was staying in 103 and 108. This question arises, in whose name were rooms 103 and 108 of the Circuit House booked? How was the booking done without the recommendation of a minister, MLA, or MP?

On the recommendation of which minister, leader, or MLA did the Deputy Collector approve the booking? What is the relationship of these criminals with the person on whose recommendation the room was booked?

If there was no recommendation from any leader or minister, then did the Deputy Collector himself give the room to the criminals to stay, and if so, for what purpose?



What is the relationship of the Deputy Collector with these criminals?

How could the Union Minister and the Deputy Collector not know that these were involved in criminal activities?

Or did they know everything and shelter the crime?

Why was the Deputy Collector not suspended despite all these incidents?

Is the government afraid?

If the Deputy Collector is suspended or legal action is taken against him, will the true face of the government be revealed?

How was the room booking done from July 21 to August 14?

Who informed the police?

How did the intelligence department not have any information even though the criminal elements had been staying in the circuit house for so long?

Where did the gun and live ammunition come from? Is there any mafia from outside the state involved in this or not?

Which big leader was this plan made to kill, was

this plan political or commercial?

What is the connection of Union Minister Prakash Paswan with these criminals? And since when have they been in such a connection?

The 6-month mobile calls of the Deputy Commissioner, Prakash Paswan, Minister Jual Oram should be checked.

What is the connection between BJP leaders Abhishek Dhal, Prakash Paswan and Madam Khushbu Yadav?

And what is their connection with the criminals?

Why has Prakash Paswan not been arrested yet?

State BJP President Manmohan Samal has expelled Prakash Paswan from the party and clarified that he is a criminal, but why has the Chief Minister and the Home Department not arrested him yet?

Will he not be brought under investigation because he is a Union Minister?

All these questions show that the government knows everything, so which big leader did the government want to kill, asked Mrs. Sahu.
