At the call of the Bharatiya Transport Mazdoor Mahasangh, an important meeting was held in Delhi regarding the one-day protest to be held at transport headquarters in all state capitals across the country on September 21st. The meeting was held at the state office of the Delhi Transport Mazdoor Sangh (affiliated to Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh), DTC Headquarters, IP Estate. Deep concern was expressed at the meeting over the poor condition of public road transport corporations across the country, the contract system, and the exploitation of workers. Welcome: Officials led by Mr. Bhanu Bhaskar - State General Secretary, Delhi Parivahan Mazdoor Sangh welcomed the guests with bouquets and shawls. Key Points - What did the speakers say? 4 Major Allegations Point 1: Governments don't want to operate public transport General Secretaries Mr. Raju Bhalerao, Mr. Vachhani, Mr. Kailash Malik, and President Mr. Kanak Singh Gohil said, "Today, the state of public road transport across the country is deplorable. Governments have stopped purchasing government buses and hiring regular employees. This has led to a severe labor shortage, and the remaining employees are overburdened, causing distress." He clarified, "Public road transport is not a means of profit, but a service-providing enterprise. Its job is to provide affordable, accessible, and safe transportation to the general public." Point 2: The shocking truth about the DTC in the nation's capital - statistics that frighten The figures presented by the speakers on the state of the DTC expose the system:

Employees: Only 6,000 regular employees, 22,000 contract employees

Buses: Only 15 government buses, 5,800 contract buses

Workshops: No government workshops are operational The speakers said, "When the situation in the nation's capital is like this, one can imagine what the situation is like in other states." Point 3: Exploitation of contract



employees - Regularization is the BMS's top priority The meeting alleged that contract employees in the DTC are being severely exploited and are being paid very low wages. The Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh stated, "We are committed to protecting the interests of contract workers. Regularizing contract workers is our first priority." Point 4: The Bugle of the Movement on September 21st - "We Run the Country, Not the Buses" All officials called for an organized movement to protect the road transport corporations, considered the lifeline of the common people. The slogan given was - "Today, when governments are shirking their responsibilities, workers must demonstrate their strength. We must move forward, holding each other's hands, in this time of crisis. We transport workers run the country, not the buses." Public Interest Appeal: A call was made to strengthen the fight to save public transport by participating in large numbers in the one-day protest to be held on September 21st at the transport headquarters in all state capitals, including Delhi. This fight is not just for the jobs of the workers, but also for affordable and safe bus service for the general public.

Editorial Conclusion:- The office bearers of Bharatiya Parivahan Mazdoor Mahasangh here in Delhi are still unable to see that the work of



public transport service in Delhi which was the responsibility of Delhi Transport Corporation and the name Delhi Transport Corporation was also written on the buses, the Delhi Government has taken it away without any prior notice and has started writing Delhi Transport Department on the buses and has completely given control over the entire property of Delhi Transport Corporation to private bus contractors and their officers. When the Delhi Government is changing the name of the Corporation without issuing a gazette notification and is writing the name of the Department instead of the Corporation on the property and buses, then for whom is this protest actually being held?

Safdarjung Hospital Releases New Cardiac Rehabilitation Guidelines

India-specific guidelines focus on exercise, lifestyle modification and prevention of recurrent cardiac problems

New Delhi, September 12: Vardhman Mahavir Medical College (VMMC) and Safdarjung Hospital on Saturday released the “Standard Clinical Practice Guidelines for Cardiac Rehabilitation in the Indian Context (2026)”, aimed at providing a structured and evidence-based framework for cardiac rehabilitation in India. Eminent scientist and public health expert Dr. Nirmal Kumar Ganguly was the Chief Guest, while Dr. Harsh Wardhan and Dr. Vijay Mohan Kohli attended as Guests of Honour. VMMC and Safdarjung Hospital Director Dr. Kavita Rani Sharma, Guideline Development Committee Chairperson Dr. Rakesh Kumar Srivastava, and WHO Regional Adviser Dr. Tashi Tobgay were also present. Experts highlighted the importance of cardiac rehabilitation in restoring physical

capacity, improving lifestyle and reducing the risk of future cardiac problems. Dr. Ajay Gupta, Professor and Head of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, said rehabilitation goes beyond exercise and requires a multidisciplinary approach to improve patients’ functional capacity and quality of life. Dr. Suman Badhal, Lead Guideline Developer, said the guidelines take into account variations in healthcare infrastructure, trained manpower, patient awareness and access to rehabilitation services across India. The guidelines recommend a multidisciplinary approach involving cardiologists, rehabilitation specialists, physiotherapists, dietitians, psychologists and nurses. They cover risk assessment, personalised exercise, lifestyle modification, psychosocial support and long-term secondary prevention. Dr. Ganguly stressed the need for accessible and structured cardiac rehabilitation services in view of the growing burden of cardiovascular diseases and appreciated the efforts behind developing the India-specific guidelines.

“TaRL Will Enable Targeted Teaching According to Children’s Learning Levels”: Keshav Kumar, District Resource Person, Muzaffarpur

Four-day training of 64 Master Trainers concludes in Muzaffarpur; participation from all 16 blocks of the district

Muzaffarpur. With the objective of providing teaching according to children’s actual learning abilities, a four-day district-level Teaching at the Right Level (TaRL) training programme for 64 Master Trainers from all 16 blocks of Muzaffarpur district was organized from 8 to 11 September at the District Institute of Education and Training (DIET), Rambagh, under the directions of Bihar Education Project, Muzaffarpur. The training programme was inaugurated by Ayush Kumar, District Programme Officer, Elementary Education and SSA, Bihar Education Project, Muzaffarpur, by lighting the ceremonial lamp. The main objective of the training was to identify the current competency levels of children in Classes 4 to 8 in Language and Mathematics, group them according to their learning levels, and provide targeted teaching to help them progress from their respective levels. The

departmental guidelines also place special emphasis on identifying children’s learning levels under TaRL and providing instruction accordingly.

During the training, the Master Trainers were familiarized with the processes of assessing children, forming groups on the basis of competency levels, conducting group-wise teaching activities, and effectively implementing TaRL at the school level.

District Resource Person Keshav Kumar said, “The core objective of TaRL is to provide teaching to children not merely on the basis of their class, but by taking into account their actual learning levels. First, the children’s competency in Language and Mathematics will be assessed and their learning levels will be identified. They will then be placed in groups having similar learning levels and supported to progress through targeted activities. This will make teaching more effective and responsive to the needs of children.” He further stated that at the school level, an initial assessment of children from Classes 4 to 8 will be conducted

in Language and Mathematics. Based on the assessment, children will be grouped according to their learning levels and provided targeted teaching up to February 2027. The training was conducted in the presence of Salim Jafar, Media Associate, First Education Foundation; Rohit Kumar, District Coordinator, First Education Foundation; and Awadh Kishore Kushwaha, BRP, Mushahari. The training was imparted to the Master Trainers in accordance with the departmental guidelines by District Resource Persons Keshav Kumar, Pappu Kumar Pankaj, Kumar Abhishek, and Abhishek Kumar, who had received training at the state-level programme organized at the State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT), Patna, from 31 August to 3 September. On the final day of the training, Indrajit Kumar Singh, Principal, DIET, Rambagh, felicitated 28 Master Trainers who demonstrated active and successful participation in the training by presenting them with Micro Certificates. Following the training, these Master Trainers will first conduct a baseline test for the children of Classes 4 to 8 in their respective schools for 21 days and provide instruction in Language and Mathematics according to their learning levels. Thereafter, in their respective blocks, they will train two teachers from primary schools and four teachers from middle schools in the TaRL methodology. Subsequently, the trained teachers will assess the actual learning status of children from Classes 4 to 8 in Language and Mathematics in their respective schools, form groups according to their learning levels, and provide targeted teaching up to February 2027. In this way, efforts will be made to extend the TaRL process to schools across all 16 blocks through the Master Trainers prepared at the district level.

A massive artificial limb camp is planned for October to ensure no one remains helpless due to disability. Recently, DM Gyanendra Singh recognized the anguish of those in society who have lost limbs due to accidents or illness.

Acknowledging their helplessness and the struggle of living without support, he has taken the historic decision to organize a massive 'artificial limb implantation camp' in October. His vision extends far beyond merely organizing an event. Making an impassioned appeal, Singh emphasized that the outreach must be so extensive that no individual with a missing limb across the district is left deprived of this benefit. His resolve is to ensure that every helpless person finds new support and everyone gains the ability to stand on their own two feet. Going beyond the official machinery to set an example of personal empathy—this is not Gyanendra Singh's first such initiative. Residents of the district have previously witnessed that whenever the plea of a poor, elderly, or helpless person reached him, he never allowed the dignity of his office or the confines of his administrative role to stand in the way of helping them. He has personally stepped out of his office to reach the doorsteps of the helpless, wiping away their tears and offering a helping hand. While officials often consider their duty fulfilled simply by facilitating access to government schemes, Gyanendra Singh's compassion goes far beyond that. In addition to ensuring government assistance,

he has frequently gone the extra mile—using his own salary—to provide financial aid to those in need. When a District Magistrate uses personal earnings to fund a poor person's medical treatment or provide aid, it proves that no position is greater than humanity itself. Today, the entire district is lauding this unique and humane initiative by District Magistrate Gyanendra Singh. The camp, scheduled for October, will serve not merely as a means to distribute prosthetic limbs but as a beacon of hope, ushering in a new dawn for hundreds of families living in darkness. The presence of officers like Gyanendra Singh instills the confidence that as long as such compassionate individuals exist in society, no helpless person is ever truly alone.

From October 2nd to October 5th, differently-abled individuals who have lost their arms—whether below the elbow or shoulder—will receive prosthetic arms free of charge. A special camp for this purpose will be organized in the district under the joint auspices of the Nishakt Jan Seva Sansthan and the Inlali Foundation.

Every Verse of the Shrimad Bhagavata Mahapurana Holds the Fragrance of Love for Shri Krishna: Mahamandaleshwar Swami Bhaskaranand Maharaj

Vrindavan. A seven-day 'Shrimad Bhagavata Katha Saptah Gyan Yajna Mahotsav' (a festival of knowledge through the week-long recitation of the Shrimad Bhagavata) has commenced with great enthusiasm and grandeur at Akhand Daya Dham, located in the Kalidah area. Organized by the Mangalayatan Seva Trust, the festival will continue until September 18, 2026.

The event began in the morning with a magnificent procession of the Shrimad Bhagavata scripture, accompanied by music and fanfare, moving from the Parikrama Marg to the venue of the discourse. Subsequently, Mahamandaleshwar Acharya Swami Bhaskaranand Maharaj—the founder of Akhand Daya Dham—seated upon the Vyaspeeth (the sacred seat of the narrator), expounded upon the glory of the Shrimad Bhagavata Mahapurana to the devotees and pilgrims who had arrived from across the country and abroad.

He described the Shrimad Bhagavata Mahapurana as the crowning jewel of ancient Indian literature. Narrated in detail by Lord Shukadeva to King Parikshit, this divine scripture offers an accessible path to attaining the Lord through devotion. Every verse within it carries the fragrance of love for Shri Krishna. It wonderfully integrates various inspiring

narratives alongside concepts such as Sadhan-Gyan (knowledge of spiritual practice) and Siddha-Gyan (realized knowledge), Sadhan-Bhakti (devotion as a practice) and Siddha-Bhakti (perfected devotion), the Maryada-Marg (path of scriptural injunctions) and Anugraha-Marg (path of divine grace), as well as the synthesis of Dvaita (dualism) and Advaita (non-dualism).

The revered Swami Bhaskaranand Maharaj stated that the narrative of the Shrimad Bhagavata is a harmonious blend of the essence of devotion (Bhakti-rasa) and spiritual wisdom. A case (Case No. 12/2026) has been registered at the Rourkela Vigilance Police Station on September 11 under Section 13(2) read with Section 13(1)(b) of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 2018. Assets Revealed During Search

Following the recovery of 5 lakh in suspected illicit income, the Vigilance department conducted simultaneous search operations on Friday night at the official's residential premises in Rourkela and Bhubaneswar. Investigations so far have revealed a two-story house spanning approximately 2,700 square feet in the Raghunathpur area of Bhubaneswar.

Additionally, four plots of land have been identified—one in Bhubaneswar and three in the outskirts of Nayagarh.

Information regarding deposits totaling ₹33.97 lakh across various accounts was also uncovered during the search. Documents pertaining to other investments and deposits were seized and are currently being verified. The Vigilance department is now examining the aspect of disproportionate assets by comparing these holdings and investments against the official's known sources of income. According to officials, further action in the case will be taken following the search and the verification of documents.

Rourkela, September 11, 2026. In a major crackdown on corruption, the Odisha Vigilance department has brought Rourkela Excise Superintendent Dhaneshwar Barad under investigation regarding alleged illegal financial transactions. The Vigilance team recovered 5 lakh in cash from a Scorpio vehicle. This action was taken based on credible information.

Vigilance had received information that the Excise Superintendent was allegedly collecting large sums of money as bribes from liquor license holders. Following this tip-off, the official's activities were kept under surveillance. Subsequently, information was received that ₹5 lakh in cash was being sent via a local liquor shop vendor in a Scorpio vehicle (Registration No. OD-14-AD-1314).The Vigilance team intercepted and searched the vehicle in front of the Excise Superintendent's office in Uditnagar. During the search, 5 lakh in cash was recovered. Upon questioning, the vendor present in the vehicle allegedly stated that the money had been handed over to him with instructions to deliver it to Excise Superintendent Barad's residence. The Excise Superintendent was also questioned regarding the recovered cash, but according to Vigilance officials, he failed to provide a satisfactory

Truck Loaded with 140 Quintals of PDS Rice Seized at Rampal Chowk

Alleged diversion of 280 sacks of rice meant for FCI; administration launches investigation
Instead of reaching the designated dealer in Lathikata, the truck arrived at the 'Jai Gosain Agro Foods' premises in Bijabahal, Kuanrmunda; police seized the vehicle and handed it over to the Marketing Inspector.



Rourkela/Kuanrmunda, September 12: A case involving the alleged illegal transportation of PDS (Public Distribution System) rice has come to light near Rampal Chowk in Bijabahal village, under Kuanrmunda block. Police seized a truck loaded with approximately 140 quintals of PDS rice from the premises of 'Jai Gosain Agro Foods Private Limited'. This incident has become a topic of discussion in the area following the police action.

According to reports, the truck (bearing registration number OD-14K-8447) was carrying 280 sacks of PDS rice. The vehicle reportedly belongs to Santosh Yadav, an L-2 contractor for the FCI (Food Corporation of India). The rice—part of Lot No. 307 from 'Shri Maa Durga Food Products' in Lathikata—had been dispatched for the FCI. Subsequently, it was loaded onto the truck for delivery to a dealer named Phuleshwari Acharya in Lathikata.

However, it is alleged that instead of proceeding to the designated location in Lathikata, the truck arrived at the 'Jai Gosain Agro Foods' premises in Bijabahal, Kuanrmunda block. Acting on a tip-off, Sundargarh SP Amrit Pal Kaur inquired about the suspicious movement of the rice and directed the Birmitrapur police to seize the truck.Upon receiving the information, Birmitrapur SDPO Pushpendu Sagar and IIC Ram Prasad Nag arrived at the scene with a police team. The police seized the truck and the rice it was carrying. The seized consignment was subsequently handed over to Anjali Hasda, the Marketing Inspector for Kuanrmunda block. Currently, the reasons for diverting the rice to a different location instead of delivering it to the designated destination are being investigated. The actual facts of the case and the issue of responsibility will become clear only after the administrative inquiry is concluded.

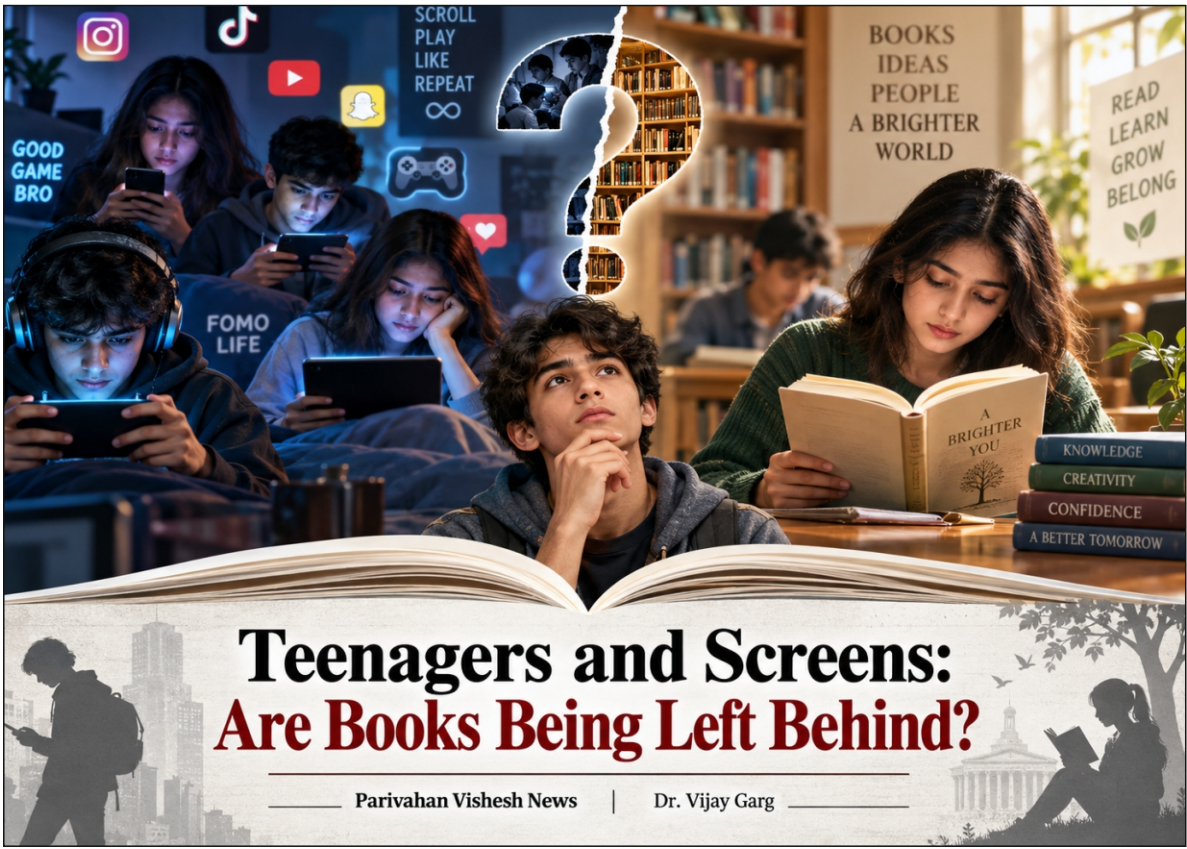

The digital age has changed the way teenagers learn, communicate and spend their free time. Smartphones, tablets, social media, online videos and digital entertainment have become an important part of everyday life. While technology provides enormous opportunities for education and creativity, the growing amount of screen time is also raising an important question: Are books slowly being left behind?

Reading has always been an important habit for developing knowledge, imagination and critical thinking. Books encourage readers to concentrate, reflect and explore ideas in depth. However, many teenagers today find it increasingly difficult to spend long periods reading a book. Short videos, social media posts,

My Thought

The decline in reading can have wider consequences. Regular reading improves vocabulary, language skills, comprehension and communication. It also exposes young minds to different cultures, experiences and perspectives. Fiction can develop imagination and empathy, while non-fiction can encourage curiosity and independent thinking. When reading becomes less frequent, some of these benefits may also be reduced.

However, technology itself should not be blamed. Digital devices can also encourage reading. E-books, online libraries, educational websites, digital newspapers and audiobooks have made knowledge more accessible than ever. The real issue is not whether teenagers use screens, but what they are doing on those screens and how much time they spend doing it. Parents and schools have an important role to play. Instead of simply asking teenagers to stop using their phones, adults should help them develop a healthy balance between digital entertainment and meaningful activities. Setting aside a fixed reading period every day can gradually turn reading into a habit. Families can create a reading-friendly environment by keeping books easily available and discussing what children are reading.

Schools can also encourage reading beyond textbooks. Book clubs, libraries, reading challenges, storytelling sessions and discussions about books can make reading enjoyable rather than making it

feel like another academic task. Teenagers should be given the freedom to choose books according to their interests—science, biographies, history, literature, adventure, sports or current affairs. Most importantly, adults themselves should become role models. If children see parents and teachers constantly looking at their phones but rarely opening a book, messages about the importance of reading may have little impact.

The goal should not be to create a conflict between books and technology. Both can coexist. A teenager can use a smartphone for learning and still spend time reading a printed book. What matters is balance, purpose and self-discipline. Screens offer speed; books offer depth. Screens can provide information instantly; books can encourage us to think deeply about that information. In a rapidly changing world, teenagers need both digital skills and the ability to concentrate, reflect and imagine.

The question is not whether books will disappear, but whether we will give the next generation enough time and encouragement to discover the joy of reading. A healthy future requires not less technology, but a better balance between the digital world and the world of books.

Digital Addiction Must Be Controlled

Digital technology has transformed our lives. Smartphones, social media, online education, entertainment platforms and artificial intelligence have made information and services available at our fingertips. Technology is undoubtedly a powerful tool, but excessive and uncontrolled use can gradually turn into a form of addiction. This growing problem, often called digital addiction, deserves serious attention.

Today, many people begin and end their day with a screen. Children spend hours watching videos or playing online games, students frequently check social media while studying, and adults may remain constantly connected to their phones for work and entertainment. What begins as a convenient habit can slowly become difficult to control.

The greatest concern is its impact on children and young people. Excessive screen use can reduce physical activity, disturb sleep and affect concentration.

Students who constantly switch between studies, social media, games and entertainment may find it harder to develop deep concentration and patience. Instead of reading a book, playing outdoors or communicating face-to-face, they may prefer the instant stimulation provided by a digital screen.

Digital addiction can also affect relationships. Families may sit together physically while each person remains absorbed in a separate device. Meaningful conversations become shorter, and personal interaction can gradually decline. A device that was designed to connect people can sometimes create emotional distance between them.

Another serious concern is the endless cycle of notifications, short videos and online content. Digital platforms are designed to keep users engaged for longer periods. As a result, people may lose track of time and repeatedly check their devices even when there is no real need to do so.

The solution is not to reject technology. Technology is essential for modern education, communication,



employment, research and innovation. The real need is to use technology consciously rather than allowing technology to control our lives.

Parents should establish healthy digital habits at home. Children should have fixed screen-free periods, especially during meals and before bedtime. Schools can educate students about responsible technology use and the importance of balancing online and offline activities. Adults, too, need to become role models by controlling their own screen habits.

Simple practices can make a significant difference: keeping the phone away

while studying, avoiding unnecessary notifications, taking regular breaks, spending time outdoors, reading books, pursuing hobbies and maintaining face-to-face conversations. A “digital detox” for a few hours each day can also help people regain control over their time and attention.

The purpose of technology is to make life better, not to consume life itself. A smartphone should remain a tool in our hands rather than becoming a master of our attention.

The digital age offers enormous opportunities, but those opportunities must be accompanied by responsibility and self-discipline. We do not need less technology; we need wiser technology use. Controlling digital addiction today can help create healthier, more focused and more connected individuals tomorrow.

Fashion has a strange way of travelling through time. Styles that were popular in the 1980s are returning today—bright colours, loose clothing, denim, retro designs, old-school hairstyles and vintage accessories. What was once considered outdated is now being presented as stylish and modern.

But behind this revival lies an interesting question: If the fashion of the 1980s can return, why can't the childhood of that era return?

The 1980s were very different from today. Childhood was largely free from smartphones, social media, online classes and constant digital entertainment. Children spent more time outdoors, playing traditional games, cycling through neighbourhoods, visiting friends and enjoying simple moments with

family. A playground did not need expensive equipment to become a world of imagination. A ball, a bicycle, a kite or even a few friends were enough to create hours of happiness. Children invented their own games and learned cooperation, patience and friendship through direct interaction.

Today, children have access to remarkable technology. Smartphones, tablets, video games and streaming platforms offer

entertainment and educational opportunities that earlier generations could not imagine. Technology has made learning faster and communication easier. Yet it has also changed the nature of childhood.

Many children now spend long hours in front of screens. Instead of meeting friends physically, they may communicate through messages or online games. Instead of running outside, they may remain indoors. The result is that children can be

that everything was better. Those years also had limitations. Education, communication and access to information were not as convenient as they are today. Modern technology has brought enormous benefits and should not be rejected.

But perhaps we can bring back some of the values of that childhood.

We can encourage children to play outdoors, read physical books, spend

time with grandparents, participate in family conversations, explore nature and develop hobbies beyond screens. A few hours without digital devices can create opportunities for imagination and genuine human connection.

The return of retro fashion reminds us that society often looks backwards for inspiration. Perhaps we should do the same with childhood—not by bringing back every feature of the past, but by recovering its simplicity.

Fashion can return because clothes can be redesigned. Childhood cannot return in exactly the same form because time moves only forward. But the joy, curiosity, freedom, friendship and simplicity associated with an earlier childhood can still be protected.

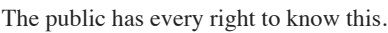
The real challenge is therefore not to recreate the 1980s. It is to create a modern childhood that combines the best of technology with the timeless values of human connection.

five years old. Given the current circumstances, prolonging the trial would merely waste the court's time and subject the family to mental agony. Judicial Perspective and Legal Precedent Within the Indian judicial system, the Supreme Court and various High Courts have held in numerous instances that if a POCSO or rape case stems from a consensual romantic relationship or an early marriage—and the couple is subsequently leading a happy married life—then the primary objective of the law remains the maintenance of justice and peace in society. By accepting the arguments presented by Advocate Vikas Deep Sharma, the court's stance clarifies that "the objective of the law is not to destroy families, but to ensure justice." Since the couple was already married and had children, continuing the proceedings would have only jeopardized the future of the victim and the children. The victim, Krishna Avatar, expressed deep gratitude to his counsel, Mr. Vikas Dev Sharma, and the Dwarka District Court for conveying the voice of a poor man to the Hon'ble High Court; thanks to this effort, the case was resolved by the Hon'ble High Court in a single instance, sparing him the ordeal of repeatedly visiting the trial court.

(7)- A maximum fee limit should be fixed to curb the arbitrary fee structures of private schools. (8)- All cases registered against students and teachers who protested against paper leaks should be withdrawn. (9)- The National Testing Agency (NTA) should be disbanded, and a more transparent and accountable system established for competitive examinations. (10)- Uniform fellowships must be ensured for all research scholars to eliminate discrimination in the field of research and provide equal opportunities to everyone.
