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Unruly E-Rickshaws - Not Challans, We Need a Strict System

Despite a ban on 236 roads, they continue to ply Delhi's roads without fear; High Court orders and LG's notification remain confined to paperwork

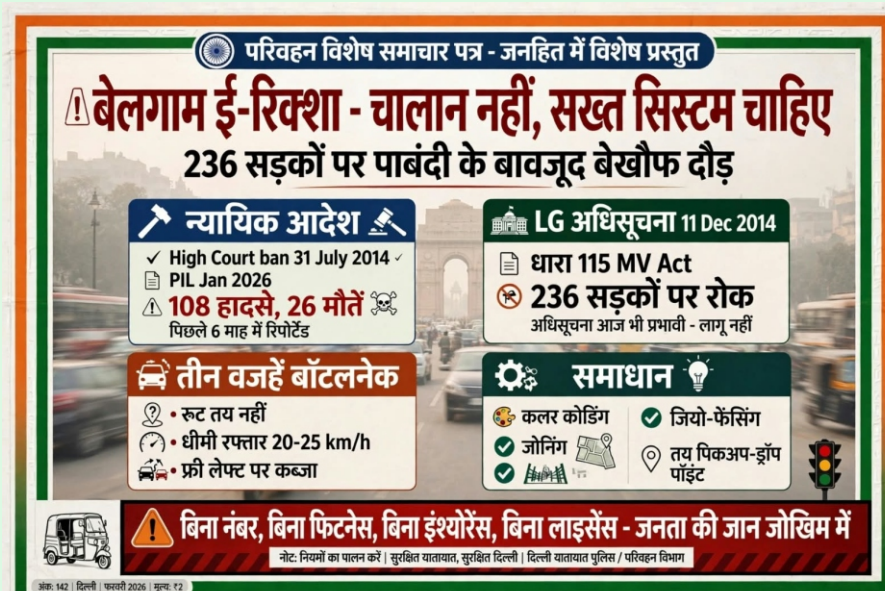

The dream of making Delhi jam-free, accident-free, and pollution-free remains entangled in the uncontrolled crowd of e-rickshaws. Despite the High Court's strict observations and the Lieutenant Governor's gazette notification, the situation remains the same. Unruly e-rickshaws are parked in front of traffic police booths, on freeways at intersections, and at school gates, while the administrative staff remain mute spectators.

What does the history of judicial intervention say?

1. The High Court's First Ban: On July 31, 2014, the Delhi High Court stated that "unruly vehicles are prima facie a threat to traffic and citizens" and banned their operation. On September 9, 2014, the court reiterated, "What is prohibited by law cannot be permitted."

2. Fresh Public Interest Litigation 2026: On January 8, 2026, a bench of justices issued notice to the Delhi government, the Transport Department, the Traffic Police, and the MCD on another PIL. The petitioner's 8-year-old daughter was killed when an uninsured e-rickshaw overturned on a restricted road. The petition cites traffic police data – 108 e-rickshaw accidents, 26 deaths, and 130 injuries between January 1 and August 20, 2025. What does the gazette notification say? The



Delhi government, after receiving approval from Lieutenant Governor Najeeb Jung, issued a notification on December 11, 2014, banning the plying and parking of e-rickshaws on 236 roads under Section 115 of the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988. These include 77 roads in New Delhi - Barakhamba Road, Tilak Marg, Rajpath, Ashoka Road, Rafi Marg, Sansad Marg, 19 roads in Central Delhi - Netaji Subhash Marg, Jawaharlal Nehru Marg, Vikas Marg, 38 roads in South Delhi, 23 in South-East, 12 in North, 15 in North-West, 11 in North-East, 9 in East, 21 in South-West, and 9 in West Delhi.

- Valid driving license, valid insurance
- Capacity: Maximum 4 passengers plus driver and 40 kg of luggage
- The PIL demands that vehicles without registration, fitness, insurance, and license be seized and impounded

The ground reality is that this notification is "not strictly enforced on the ground." Three reasons - how bottlenecks are being created

The Traffic Police itself admitted in the High Court that more than 1 lakh illegal e-rickshaws are plying in Delhi and are running rampantly even on 236 prohibited roads.

What are the government rules and regulations? The Central Government notified the Central Motor Vehicles (Sixteenth Amendment) Rules, 2014, giving e-rickshaws the status of "Special Purpose Battery Operated Vehicle".

- Registration is mandatory under the Delhi government's E-Rickshaw Service Scheme 2014
- Fitness certificate every 3

- Routeless expansion: Permits were waived in 2016 in the name of last-mile connectivity, but the network was not finalized. The result is a concentration of 50-60 e-rickshaws at a single intersection.
- Speed mismatch: The design speed of main roads is 40-50 km/h, while e-rickshaws are 20-25 km/h. Sudden braking and turning upon seeing a passenger in the middle of the road leads to long queues and accidents.
- Occupation of freeways: Illegal stands at intersections, markets, and bridge slopes block freeways, which congests the entire traffic system.

- Color coding and zoning: A different color for each zone, as in rural services. E-rickshaws from one zone will not be able to enter another zone.

- Geo-fencing: GPS-based monitoring. Auto-cut and challan if vehicles enter 236 restricted routes.

- Defined pickup and drop points: Designated stands 50 meters away from metro stations, markets, and intersections, with freeways completely vacant.

- Strict enforcement of a complete ban on school children and scrapping of vehicles without number plates.

The "friendly attitude" of the Delhi Traffic Police and Transport Department puts public lives at risk. Unless the trial ends in two days, unless the notification for 236 roads is implemented with cameras and impounding, Delhi will not be able to become jam-free. What is needed now is willpower, not paperwork.

Today's Cybersecurity Thought

Fraudulent issuance of SIM cards through the misuse of customer credentials and biometric data is one of the most significant emerging cyber security threats facing India today.



A recent investigation by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has uncovered an alleged scam involving the fraudulent issuance of mobile SIM cards in the names of individuals who were unaware that additional mobile connections had been registered under their identities. The investigation suggests that customer credentials and biometric information were misused to obtain SIM cards without the knowledge or consent of the legitimate subscribers. Background The issuance of SIM cards in India requires customers to complete the Know Your Customer (KYC) process, which includes identity verification through official documents and biometric authentication. This process is designed to ensure that mobile connections are issued only to verified individuals and to prevent the misuse of telecommunication services. However, according to the CBI's findings, certain individuals or entities allegedly exploited weaknesses in the authentication process to fraudulently obtain multiple SIM cards. Modus Operandi The investigation identified two primary methods through which the alleged fraud was carried out:

- Deceptive Multiple e-KYC Authorisations
- Customers visiting authorised SIM card providers for legitimate purposes, such as obtaining a new connection, upgrading services, or completing routine verification procedures, were allegedly misled into authorising themselves multiple times during the electronic KYC (e-KYC) process.

- In many cases, customers believed they were completing a single legitimate verification. However, their repeated biometric or identity authorisations were

allegedly used to issue additional SIM cards without their knowledge.

- Misuse of Previously Collected Biometric Data

The investigation also indicates that biometric information collected for other legitimate and authorised purposes was allegedly misused to facilitate the issuance of additional SIM cards. This may have involved the unauthorised use of fingerprints or other biometric identifiers that had been lawfully collected during previous transactions.

- Such practices represent a serious violation of customer privacy, data protection principles, and telecommunication regulations.

Key Findings

- The CBI investigation highlights the following concerns:
- Numerous SIM cards were allegedly issued in the names of unsuspecting individuals.
- Many affected subscribers were unaware that multiple mobile connections had been activated using their identities.
- Customer credentials, including identity information and biometric data, were allegedly used without informed consent.
- Fraudulent registrations appear to have been facilitated through manipulation of the e-KYC process and misuse of biometric authentication.
- The activities indicate potential weaknesses in oversight

- mechanisms designed to safeguard subscriber information.
- Security and Privacy Implications
- Identity Misuse
- Individuals may unknowingly become associated with mobile numbers used for illegal activities, exposing them to legal liabilities and reputational damage.
- Data Privacy Violations
- The misuse of biometric information constitutes a significant breach of privacy and raises serious concerns about data handling practices within the telecommunications ecosystem.
- National Security Risks
- Fraudulently obtained SIM cards can potentially be used for criminal activities, financial fraud, cybercrime, and other actions that may threaten public safety and national security.
- Erosion of Consumer Trust
- Such incidents undermine public confidence in the KYC framework and in organisations entrusted with collecting and safeguarding personal information.
- Regulatory and Legal Implications
- If proven, the alleged activities may constitute violations of:
- Telecommunications regulations governing subscriber verification.
- Data protection and privacy requirements.
- Criminal laws relating to fraud and forgery.
- Regulations governing the collection, storage, and use of biometric information.

These findings may lead to stricter compliance requirements, enhanced monitoring of SIM registration processes, and stronger safeguards for protecting customer biometric data.

The CBI investigation has revealed an alleged scheme involving the unauthorised issuance of SIM cards through the misuse of customer credentials and biometric information. The evidence suggests that individuals were either misled into repeatedly authorising e-KYC procedures or had their biometric data used without their knowledge to obtain additional SIM connections.

These findings raise serious concerns regarding data protection, consumer privacy, and the integrity of subscriber verification systems. Strengthened oversight, stricter compliance mechanisms, and enhanced safeguards for biometric information will be essential to prevent similar incidents in the future.

Cyber Security Message Always complete biometric authentication only at trusted and authorised centres. Regularly verify the mobile numbers registered in your name, and immediately report any suspicious activity to your telecom service provider and the appropriate authorities.

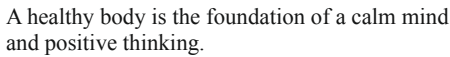

Rishi Panchami: A Festival of Purity and Atonement Dedicated to the Saptarishis (Seven Sages) Today

A special fast observed by women on Bhadrapada Shukla Panchami; seeking liberation from ritual impurities associated with menstruation and praying for enduring marital bliss.

Introduction: The festival of Rishi Panchami, observed on the fifth day (Panchami) of the bright fortnight (Shukla Paksha) of the Bhadrapada month, is being celebrated with devotion today. Falling the day after Ganesh Chaturthi, this festival involves the worship of the Saptarishis (the seven great sages) and a fast observed by women to seek absolution for transgressions committed knowingly or unknowingly.

Details for this year:

Date: Tuesday, September 15, 2026
Tithi (Lunar Day): Bhadrapada Shukla Panchami
Significance: Worship of the Saptarishis — Kashyapa, Atri, Bharadwaja, Vishvamitra, Gautama, Jamadagni, and Vashishtha.

Key Highlights at a Glance:

- Honoring the Saptarishis: This fast is a day to express gratitude towards the great sages who contributed to the welfare of society.
- A Special Fast for Women: Primarily observed by women, this fast symbolizes the cleansing of unintentional sins and devotion towards one's husband.
- Vishwakarma Puja in Kerala: In Kerala, this day is also celebrated as Vishwakarma Puja.
- As 'Bhai Panchami': In the Maheshwari community, this day is known as 'Bhai Panchami'; sisters observe a fast and tie Rakhi (sacred thread) for the longevity of their brothers.

Worship Method and Rituals: On Rishi Panchami, one should bathe in the morning and wear clean clothes. Create a square

Mandala (sacred diagram) on a clean spot in the house using turmeric, Kumkum (vermilion), and Roli. Install the idols or images of the Saptarishis upon it and perform Abhishek (ritual bathing) using pure water and Panchamrit (a mixture of milk, curd, honey, ghee, and sugar). Offer sandalwood paste (Tilak), flower garlands, the sacred thread (Yajnopavita), and white garments. Conclude the worship by offering fruits, sweets, incense, and lamps, while seeking forgiveness for any errors. In many regions, this worship is performed on the banks of a river or pond.

Dietary Guidelines for the Fast: Consuming grains is considered prohibited on this day. Those observing the fast consume specific types of rice and tubers. In Maharashtra, the dish known as 'Rishi Panchami Bhaji' holds special significance. This vegetable dish is prepared in the traditional style of the Rishis (sages), using minimal spices. It incorporates seasonal vegetables such as amaranth leaves, yardlong beans (chavali), elephant foot yam (suran), sweet potato, colocasia (arbi), raw banana, snake gourd, pumpkin, peanuts, and colocasia leaves. While traditionally cooked in earthen pots, it is now prepared in metal vessels.

This day also holds great importance in Jainism. The Shvetambara sect observes it as the conclusion of the Paryushan festival, whereas the Digambara sect marks it as the beginning of the Mahaparva (great festival). Essence of the Vrat Katha (Legend): According to ancient lore, the widowed daughter of a Brahmin from the kingdom of Vidarbha was afflicted with worms in her body. Upon spiritual contemplation, the sages discovered that in a past life, she had violated the rule prohibiting contact with kitchen utensils and worship materials while menstruating, and had failed to observe the Rishi Panchami fast. Following the sages' counsel, she observed the Rishi Panchami fast with sincere devotion and sought forgiveness, thereby becoming cleansed of her transgression. This illustrates the aspect of atonement associated with this fast.

DC Varsha Khanwal gave necessary instructions regarding SIR-2026 campaign

Jhajjar, September 14

DC and District Election Officer Varsha Khanwal said that as per the instructions of the Election Commission of India, the work of Special Intensive Revision (SIR)-2026 is effectively underway in all four assembly constituencies of Jhajjar district to make the voter list accurate, transparent and updated. The district administration's special focus is to ensure that no eligible citizen is deprived of inclusion in the voter list and that necessary amendments in the voter list, along with removing ineligible names, are completed within the stipulated time. She directed the officials to expedite the work as per the revised schedule of the Election Commission of India and complete all the processes in a timely manner with mutual coordination.

Fill Form-6 immediately to become an eligible young voterThe Deputy Commissioner stated that eligible young voters should apply by filling out Form 6. Furthermore, if an eligible citizen's name is not included in the preliminary voter list, they can submit a claim for inclusion in the voter list by filling out Form 6 along with the prescribed documents and a declaration. He specifically appealed to such newly eligible voters to immediately fill out Form 6 upon fulfilling their eligibility criteria and enroll their names in the voter list, rather than waiting for the September 30 deadline.

There is also an opportunity to file claims and objections till September 30.The Deputy Commissioner stated that, as per the revised schedule for SIR-2026, eligible citizens can file claims and objections regarding the voter list until September 30. Received claims and objections will be resolved by October 28, while the final voter list will be published on November 6. He urged eligible citizens not to wait for the deadline and to check their names and details in the voter list and those of all

eligible family members in advance.

If there is a mistake in the name, address or other details, then get it corrected through

Form-8.The DC stated that any errors in the voter list, including name, address, age, photo, or other details, can be applied for corrections through Form 8. The application must be accompanied by the prescribed documents and a required declaration. He added that the removal of a deceased, ineligible, permanently relocated, or previously registered voter from the voter list is mandatory.

The DC stated that citizens can contact the ERO or Assistant Electoral Registration Officer (AERO) for their claims and objections by contacting the BLO. Online application facilities are also available.

You can take help from BLO, ERO and AEROThe DC said that for any information related to the voter list or assistance with the application process, citizens can contact their local BLO, ERO, or AERO. The concerned officers and staff will provide necessary information and guidance. He added that for information and assistance regarding the voter list, the voter helpline number 1950 can also be contacted.

Make sure to check the names of all eligible family membersThe District Election Officer appealed to the residents of the district to check their name, address, age, photo and other details of themselves and all eligible family members in the preliminary voter list. He said that it is very important for a free, fair and transparent election process that every eligible citizen's name is included in the voter list and that the list remains error-free and up-to-date. He said that only with the active participation of citizens can the voter list be made more accurate, reliable and up-to-date.



Nurseries should be run as per the rules, operators should complete the licensing process on time: DC

To ensure the quality of plants and standards of nursery operation, license is mandatory, operators should follow the prescribed parameters.

Jhajjar, September 14.

DC Varsha Khanwal has directed all nursery operators in the district to ensure compliance with the provisions laid down under the Haryana Horticultural Nursery Act, 2025 and Rules, 2006. She said that obtaining a license for nurseries is mandatory and operators should complete the licensing and renewal process within the stipulated time frame. The main objective of the licensing system is to maintain the quality of plants and ensure the prescribed standards in the operation of nurseries, so that quality plants can be made available to farmers and people associated with the horticulture sector.25 mother plants and one acre of land are required for a fruit plant nursery.

District Horticulture Officer Dr. Rajendra Lather, while providing detailed information regarding nursery licenses, stated that licenses will be issued based on the category of plants. For a fruit plant nursery, it is essential to specify the relevant variety and sub-varieties. Additionally, it is mandatory to have at least 25 mother plants with known pedigrees and a minimum of one acre of land. He added that for a nursery of other horticultural plants, ownership of at least 1,000 square meters of land or a registered lease of at least three years is required. Furthermore, the nursery operator must submit a certificate confirming at least one week of training from a recognized institution. The licensing process will only proceed after meeting the prescribed criteria.

After the application, the nursery will be inspected.

Dr. Rajendra Lather stated that after receiving an application for a new license or renewal, the concerned nursery will be inspected. During the inspection, the prescribed standards, land, plant material, and other necessary arrangements will be checked. Following the inspection, an online report will be filed according to the established procedures, and the license will be issued or renewed as per the rules.

Fees are fixed for new licenses and renewals.

The District Horticulture Officer stated that the fee for a new license is 20,000 rupees for a fruit plant nursery and 10,000 rupees for a nursery of other plants. Similarly, for license renewal, the fee is 10,000 rupees for a fruit plant nursery and 5,000 rupees for a nursery of other plants.

He stated that nursery operators are required to apply for renewal at least 30 days before the expiration of their license. A late fee of ₹2,000 will be charged if the application is filed after the stipulated period. He urged all nursery operators to complete the licensing and renewal process on time with the necessary documents, without waiting until the last minute.

DC Varsha Khanwal directed the concerned officials to provide the district's nursery operators with complete information regarding the licensing process, required documents, and prescribed criteria. She stated that the quality of plants is directly linked to the success of farmers and the horticulture sector, so it is essential that nurseries operate in accordance with established rules and standards. She urged all nursery operators to comply with the regulations and complete their licensing process on time.

Path Cleared for Urgent Repair of NH-143 in Birmitrapur

NHAI Completes Technical Evaluation; Two Companies Qualify for Financial Bids

Emergency Repair and Maintenance Planned for the Stretch Between Km 211+200 and 216+200

Birmitrapur/Rourkela, September 14, 2026: The National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) has completed a crucial stage in the process for the urgent repair and maintenance of National Highway-143 (formerly NH-23) within the Birmitrapur town area. According to an order issued by the NHAI's Odisha Regional Office, the technical evaluation of tenders received for the repair work has been concluded.

As per the order issued on September 10, 2026, two bidders have been found technically qualified for the urgent repair and maintenance of the existing road stretch from Km 211+200 to Km 216+200. These include M/s KR Logistic and Construction Private Limited and M/s SBB Constructions Private Limited.

NHAI has deemed the technical bids of both companies as 'responsive'—meaning they comply with the prescribed technical standards.

The official order stated that the financial bids of the two qualified bidders were scheduled to be opened at 4:00 PM on September 10. Interested qualified bidders were permitted to be present at the NHAI Odisha Regional Office during this process.

This national highway, passing through the Birmitrapur town area, is vital for local commuting as well as for the movement of freight and inter-state traffic. Improving the road's poor condition is expected to facilitate smoother vehicular movement and enhance road safety. This move by NHAI has raised hopes that the work will now commence, addressing long-standing demands from the region for road repairs.



Why did the highway on which Nepal was moving ahead with China become the cause of the disaster?

In the past few years, love for China has been on the rise in almost all of India's neighboring countries. Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, and even Nepal have been openly expressing their love for China from time to time. Pakistan, while a

proclaimed pawn of China, has quickly come to understand the cost of this love. A few years ago, Sri Lanka fell head over heels in love with China. The world then witnessed their economic ruin. This isn't too old. Similarly, Bangladesh is currently singing the tune of love for China. For the past few years, Nepal has also been actively inciting anti-India sentiments in its own country. Its leaders are creating the impression among Nepalese that India is responsible for their problems and that China is their true well-wisher and savior.

Due to this thinking, they have become very vocal and started making anti-India statements. To capitalize on this sentiment, they have started talking about sitting in the lap of China, but they do not know that nature has also maintained a relationship with the country with which they have a relationship of bread and daughter. In fact, the connectivity between India and Nepal is very easy. On the other hand, if Nepal tries to improve its connectivity with China, then the Himalayas come in the way. This means that with the same ease with which Nepal's geographical location is connected with India, the situation between China and Nepal is equally complex.

According to experts, both countries have built large-scale road and other infrastructure projects in this extremely fragile Himalayan region to enhance connectivity. The devastating floods on August 26th have now exposed the vulnerability of this entire region. Following the glacier-related disaster on the China-Nepal border, roads, bridges, ports, and other projects were destroyed. China's Gyirong Port and Nepal's Rasuwagadhi Dry Port were also severely affected. The question now is: what is it about these road links being built between China and Nepal that has made this entire region so vulnerable?

According to information, the Friendship Highway connecting China and Nepal is approximately 800 kilometers long. It runs from Lhasa in Tibet to the Nepal border. After the border, the Araniko Highway on the Nepal side connects it to Kathmandu. This entire route is a vital route for trade and travel between China and Nepal. This is no ordinary area. It is one of the most sensitive mountainous regions in the world. It is home to glaciers, icy lakes, extremely steep mountains, and active geological structures beneath the ground. Therefore, every task, from widening the

road to building tunnels and other projects, is fraught with risk.

A 2024 scientific study identified 2,688 glacier lakes along the China-Nepal transportation corridors. According to the study, many of these areas were highly vulnerable to glacier lake outburst floods (GLOFs). The Kyrirung-Kathmandu corridor was also identified as a high-risk area. In this study, scientists also clarified that in the event of a major glacier lake outburst, approximately 103 kilometers of China-Nepal Highway, 103 bridges, two major dry ports, and 3,301 buildings could be affected at any time. This means that the danger was not just emerging today, but already present.

According to experts, another 2024 study also pointed out a link between construction activities on the China-Nepal transport corridor and the increased risk of GLOFs. Researchers stated that glacier retreat and climate change are increasing the risk of glacial lakes. Furthermore, the expansion of infrastructure and hydro projects in the Himalayas is increasing the presence of people and structures in these areas. This means that the threat isn't just from nature. The problem is that humans are increasingly entering areas where nature is already highly unstable.

According to experts, increasing road connectivity with China is crucial for Nepal from both strategic and



economic perspectives. Nepal has long been striving to increase trade with China and reduce its dependence on India, but changing geographical realities is not easy. The Himalayas stand like a wall between Nepal and China. Therefore, every major road link with China passes through extremely high and difficult terrain. The Friendship Highway also passes through this Himalayan region. Many sections of it are considered vulnerable to landslides, avalanches, and glacier-related incidents. The August 26 incident further exposed this weakness. The approximately 42-kilometer road from Betrawati to the Rasuwagadhi border on the Nepal side was washed away in floods. Several bridges were also damaged, meaning that the very link that Nepal considered a way to enhance its economic strength suddenly became its biggest weakness. Ramswaroop Rawatsare

'Our Anganwadi, Our Responsibility' Will Empower the Future of a Developed India – Annapurna Devi

The foundation of the India of 2047 is being laid at Anganwadis; the community becomes a partner in nutrition and child development.

Varanasi: Union Minister for Women and Child Development, Smt. Annapurna Devi, stated in her article that the India of 2047 will be built by children who have not yet even stepped into a school. Their journey toward becoming healthy, confident, and capable adults begins much earlier—specifically during the first 1,000 days of life. For millions of Indian children and their mothers, the greatest support on this journey is a familiar neighborhood institution: the Anganwadi. Long before entering a classroom, children have their weight and height measured at the Anganwadi, receive hot, nutritious meals, and hear nursery rhymes outside the home for the first time. It is also here that expectant parents receive counseling. Today, 14 lakh Anganwadi centers serve as the primary point of contact between citizens and the government, reaching over 8.9 crore children, women, and adolescent girls. The 25.2 lakh Anganwadi workers and helpers employed there come from the very communities they serve; the Anganwadi has always been an integral part of the local community.

When Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched the 'Poshan Abhiyaan' (Nutrition Mission) in March 2018, this familiar institution became the cornerstone of a national movement. On September 9, 2024, the ninth



'Rashtriya Poshan Maah' (National Nutrition Month) was launched with the theme 'Hamari Anganwadi, Hamari Zimmedari' (Our Anganwadi, Our Responsibility). While the responsibility for providing quality services rests entirely with the government—a commitment that remains unwavering—an Anganwadi center becomes truly empowered only when the community embraces it as its own. Building a 'Viksit Bharat' (Developed India) is possible only through 'Sabka Prayas' (collective effort); nutrition cannot be viewed merely as a government service. From Beneficiaries to Partners Community ownership often remained merely a slogan, but this year it has been given an institutional form. Anganwadi Management Committees link parents, Panchayat representatives, and self-help groups to the center, ensuring that benefits reach every eligible child. Through social audits, the community reviews services, verifies entitlements, and formally records its findings. In this way, accountability transforms into internal monitoring by the families availing these services. Mothers are at the heart of this entire process; the 'Supplementary Nutrition Programme' (SNP) menu board displays daily details of hot cooked meals and 'take-home rations.' When a mother knows her child's entitlements, transparency becomes a daily habit, and the community becomes an informed partner in ensuring quality.

During Poshan Maah 2026, these committees, social audits, and menu boards are being activated;

simultaneously, events such as 'Tithi Bhoj' (community feasts), tasting sessions, and recipe demonstrations are being organized.Beyond the Menu Board

(1)- The first aspect is the food itself; a balanced diet is essential for a 'well-nourished India'—comprising cereals and millets, pulses, nuts and seeds, milk and dairy products, eggs, seasonal fruits, and green vegetables. The 'Comprehensive Guidelines for Supplementary Nutrition Programme, 2026,' released in July, clearly define hot cooked meals and reinforce micronutrient standards under the National Food Security Act, 2013.

(2)- The second aspect is early childhood education; what a child eats and what they learn are deeply interconnected. Anganwadi workers track 34 developmental milestones during a child's first three years. The 'Navchetna' and 'Aadharshila' curricula link nutrition and care with school readiness.

(3)- The third aspect begins even before the child is born; a mother's nutrition during pregnancy determines the foundation of the child's life. This nutrition-focused initiative also marks the completion of ten years of the 'Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana,' reflecting the Prime Minister's conviction that no woman should be forced to choose between her livelihood and her health. Over the past decade, 4.65 crore beneficiaries have received a total of ₹21,511 crore directly into their accounts. Further strengthening

this under 'Mission Shakti,' additional benefits are provided if the second child is a girl. The Economic Survey 2025-26 clarifies that such financial assistance is truly effective only when accompanied by proper counseling, enabling informed decision-making within the family. A review of Rajasthan's 'Cash Plus' model—which linked financial aid with continuous 'behavior change communication'—showed that the proportion of women spending this benefit on food rose from 30 percent to 89 percent. Moreover, involving husbands and families in this dialogue helped dispel myths and misconceptions regarding maternal nutrition. This collaborative approach thrives around Anganwadis because maternal nutrition has never been the mother's sole responsibility.

Honoring the 'Nari Shakti' (Women Power) at the Core Anganwadi workers stand at the heart of this entire system. Community ownership certainly does not imply placing the entire burden of nutrition and early childhood care solely upon them. Its true meaning lies in respecting, supporting, and empowering them...experience and the trust built upon it are invaluable. This September, I urge every citizen to visit at least one Anganwadi center in their area. Talk to the Anganwadi worker, check the menu board, and ask how you can contribute; fathers, grandparents, Panchayats, and self-help groups all play a vital role in this.This September, in our Anganwadis...

A dispute erupted at the Kukru Circle Office in the Chandil subdivision of Ranchi over the submission

of an SIR form, with the Circle Officer accused of tearing the form. The dispute reportedly escalated between villagers and office staff, leading to a violent protest and demonstration within the office premises. In response, the administration deployed a large number of police personnel. A tense atmosphere prevailed in the area. People staged a sit-in
